The Palm Beach Zoo & Conservation Society will hold its inaugural "Save the Panther 5k" race, presented by Sagicor Life Insurance, at 7:30 a.m. Jan. 4 on zoo grounds at 1301 Summit Blvd.

The starting line begins at the zoo's parking lot, and goes through Dreher Park, entering the zoo on the west side. The running path passes by the Wallaby Viewing station, Fennec Fox exhibit, Ocelots, Siamang Island and more on the way to the finish line in the Interactive Fountain by the zoo's entrance.

Mira, the Zoo's new Florida Panther, will be moving from quarantine quarters to the panther exhibit in a holding yard during the final week of race registration, leading up to an official public debut during a special "Panther Talk" at 9:45 a.m. after the race finishes.

Christine Lynn donates \$250K to nursing school

Florida Atlantic University's Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing has received a \$250,000 gift from its namesake donor.

Lynn's gift will be used to prevent brain drain by creating a fund to help retain the best and brightest faculty at FAU, officials say.

There is a critical national nurse faculty shortage, and the most talented faculty are being heavily recruited by universities throughout the country, they say. The faculty talent retention fund provides incentives and rewards for special faculty accomplishments, officials say.

"It is vital that the quality of nursing care and nurse leadership remain strong, and this begins with students in our community obtaining a solid nursing education from the best faculty," Lynn said.

Lynn is a registered nurse and the widow of Eugene Lynn, one of Boca Raton's largest philanthropists. The nursing college was named after her following a \$10 million donation in 2001.
